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Inspired by the "Strandbeesten" from Dutch Artist Theo Jansen:

Hase Bikes Releases the Beasts!

Smoke rises from a large wooden crate with the Hase Bikes logo. Threatening sounds of growling and snarling can be heard from within. Trainer Waldemar Kobus carefully approaches the heavily guarded crate and opens it. The snarling swells to a roar, and from inside a cloud of smoke, two glowing, white eyes can be seen – or are they headlights?

The Hase Bikes Beast exits its crate, walking on spindly, almost insect-like legs. Then trainer Kobus swings himself onto the saddle. Can he tame the Beast?

For the 25th anniversary of his company, Marec Hase wanted to make something crazy and new. He found the inspiration for his project in the "Strandbeesten" ("beach beasts") designed by Dutch artist Theo Jansen: "Theo's works fascinated me, and I wanted to know if it's possible to make something like that with our bikes."

It is. With express permission from the artist, Marec and his team set to work on bringing his idea to life. Eventually, they came up with not only one, but two "Hase Bikes Beasts", which were presented to the public for the first time at this year's Special Bikes Show: the one-seater "Little Beast" and two-seater "Big Beast". "We adopted the basic design of Jansen's linkage that moves the legs of his Strandbeesten and placed it under a Kettwiesel and a Pino frame," explained Marec.

The big difference to Jansen's works: the Strandbeesten move on their own by harnessing the wind, while the two Hase Bikes Beasts are propelled by muscle power. In other words: whereas Theo Jansen's works are only for looking at, you can actually ride the Hase Bikes Beasts!

"We aren't planning on mass-producing them," explained Marec, "but we'll certainly be taking them to shows and other events, where people are welcome to try them out."

The Hase Bikes Beasts have been presented in a total of six performances by German actor Waldemar Kobus, who is well-known in Germany for his roles in several films and television series. For Kobus, the project was a labour of love.

"I met Marec not long before he founded his company and have been riding my own Hase Bike for 10 years now. I was totally honoured when Marec asked me whether I wanted to play a role in the premiere of the Beasts."
